At that place Moses built and monument and called it Jehovah-nissi, which means, the Lord is my banner.



That day all the people could look up on the hill and see Moses' hands held high in prayer and praise and obedience to the Lord. He was an example to them of how they also should obey the Lord without murmur or complaint.


