For you see that is often what happened, because no man can know what a dream means. Only God knows those things.

When Pharaoh's chief butler, the cupbearer, heard of Pharaoh's dreams, he said to Pharaoh, "Today I remember my faults. When Pharaoh was angry with me and put me in the prison, both me and the chief baker, we both had dreams one night.
