DON'T TRUST YOUR FEELINGS Wise man-Foolish man Part VII Numbers 13, 14

The Lord brought the children of Israel safely out of Egypt. He promised to take them to a new land of milk and honey, that is a land that would produce bounteous crops and provide them a good home. After traveling through the wilderness the people finally arrived at the border of that Promised Land. The Lord instructed Moses to choose twelve men, one from each of the twelve tribes, and send them to spy out the land. Each of the men was to be a ruler from his tribe.

So Moses did as God had instructed him and sent the men into the land of Canaan. The men were to go to different areas of the land and bring back a report as to what the land was like. They were to tell Moses what the inhabitants of the land were like as well.

The men went in and searched the land. Near one town they cut down a bunch of grapes that was so heavy it took two men to carry it between them on a pole. The men searched the land for forty days, and then they returned to Moses with their report.

This is the report that the spies brought to Moses: They said, "We went into the land where you sent us, and it truly does flow with milk and honey. Look at this fruit that we have brought back. But even so, the people that live there are very strong and their cities are walled. There are giants living in the land."

But Caleb, who was one of the spies, tried to calm down the people who became very upset at this report. He said, "Let us go up at once and take the land, for we are well able to take it."

But the other spies replied, "We will not go!" They brought a bad report against the land, saying, "This land will destroy our people. The giants are great and we felt like grasshoppers next to them."

Immediately all the people cried out. They grumbled against Moses and Aaron, their leaders. They complained, saying, "We wish that God had let us die in Egypt, or in the wilderness! Why has God brought us to this land so that we can be killed in battle? Our wives and our children will be defenseless. We would be better off to return to Egypt!"

men who stood with him, but they were stopped when the glory of the Lord appeared.


Because of this rebellion against God, the children of Israel were forced to wander around that same wilderness for forty long years.



In the end, he will find that his feelings and fears have led him in the wrong direction, but then it will be too late, just as with the spies and the children of Israel. All those who disobeyed God in this matter died in the wilderness, and they never were able to enter into that wonderful land that God had promised. That is a very high price to pay for following your feelings instead of the truth!
