The angel of the Lord said, "Go with the men, but speak only that word which I give you." So Balaam traveled on with the princes.

How angry it must have made the Lord to see Balaam act so rebelliously in wanting to go with the princes of Moab, and then to beat the poor little donkey besides. How gracious and merciful of God to spare Balaam rather than striking him dead, as he could have done for his wickedness. God gave Balaam every opportunity to choose to do what God wanted him to do, and yet, Balaam made the wrong choice. Balaam longed for the riches and power of Moab, so that he was willingly to go against what he knew was the truth. Balaam was looking for the riches of this world at the expense of the next.

The Lord gives each of us the opportunity to choose to do right, but if we persist in going our own way, he sometimes lets us. Hopefully, by suffering the consequences of our wrong choices, we will see that God's way is the best way.

I love this story where the Lord allows the donkey to speak to Balaam. Balaam must have been utterly amazed and shocked to hear that donkey speak. Still, Balaam's heart wasn't changed. He was only willing to obey the Lord for the moment, because of fear. No matter how many wonders the Lord does, people will still refuse to obey his voice or trust in him. God who is the Creator can make a donkey speak or open our eyes to see angels, but it seems that we often still choose to go our own way and disobey him. It is not seeing miracles that convinces men to follow God, but it is a change of heart, which only God himself can give us.
