GENESIS –Lesson 6

Learn: And God blessed them, and God said unto them, be fruitful, and multiply, and replenish the earth, and subdue it: and have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over every living thing that moveth upon the earth. Genesis 1:28

Read: Genesis 1:24- Genesis 2:3

God knew that in the fullness of time, He would become a man.

The word "man" is actually "adam", and is related to "earth" (Hebrew adamah).

Both man and woman were created in God's image, and thus both possess equally an eternal spirit capable of personal fellowship with their Creator.

8. What 4 instructions did the Creator give to the two people that He had made? Genesis 1:28

Define or explain each of the above instructions given by the Creator.

The word "replenish" as used in verse 28 does not mean "refill." The Hebrew word "male" simply means to "fill", "fulfill" or be "filled" as does the Old English term itself.

Man has never yet filled the earth, in accordance with God's command; though many people today are unduly alarmed over the so-called population explosion, urging all sorts of controls to slow the population growth. We can be sure that God has never rescinded His command, and He is completely aware of what population the earth can support. Even at the present level of man's technological knowledge, the earth could support a much larger population than it now holds.

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9. Psalm 8:6-8 reminds us again of God's command concerning the earth. What does it say?

These verses tell us along with the Genesis verses, that God has made man to be steward over all the earth. The twofold commission to subdue and have dominion, to conquer and rule, embraces all productive human activities. Science and Technology, research and development, theory and application, study and practice, and so forth, are various ways of expressing these two concepts.

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10. Hebrews 2:8 reminds us again of the position that man is to have over the earth. But what does the last phrase of the verse say?
