- 2. In Genesis we find the origin of marriage, and that it was God ordained. But in the reality of this world, we know that not everyone marries. In fact, often times a person may never find someone to marry. Or they may be content to live alone. Is God displeased if some believers are unmarried?

It is significant that ethnologists and anthropologists find evidence that monogamous, permanent marriage has everywhere and in all ages been considered the ideal and preferred form of family life. True happiness, true fulfillment, true accomplishment of God's purposes necessarily involve obedience to God's primal command.

Because of the entrance of sin into the world, it has not always been expedient for God to rigidly enforce this ideal. He has seemed to sanction (or at least to allow) polygamy at times (e.g. Abraham, Jacob, David) and to bless the work of some who practiced it. Similarly, the Mosaic law allowed divorce, and, in some cases, God commanded it. See Ezra 10:11. THE GENESIS RECORD p. 102 by Dr. Henry Morris

13. Is a single believer then free to marry an unbeliever? II Corinthians 6:14-16 Explain your answer.
