Learn: I am the true vine, and my father is the husbandman. Every branch in me that beareth not fruit he taketh away: and every branch that beareth fruit, he purgeth it, that it may bring forth more fruit. This chapter CONTRASTS DISOBEDIENT Israel with THE OBEDIENT Servant. The LORD reasons with Israel using 13 questions.

- 1. Using Deuteronomy 24:1 explain (under the Jewish law), who was responsible for initiating a divorce and what was required?
- 2. In the case of slavery, a certificate of the sale is needed. Why were people sold as slaves? II Kings 4:1
- 3. In the case of Israel, what was unusual about God having divorced them, and sold them? v 1
- 4. What was the reason that God gave for this strange situation? v1
- 5. How did God describe the iniquities and transgressions of Israel that resulted in His putting her away? Jeremiah 3:6-11
- 6. Was the LORD putting Israel away because they had completely abandoned Him? What was the situation? See I Kings 18:21; II Kings 10:18-30.
- 7. God describes Himself as the Husband of Israel. He says that His Son, the Lord Jesus is the Bridegroom of the Church. Both relationships with God are described as

marriages. What does the Lord say about the church (each member of His body) as regards mixing the world's beliefs with our worship of Him? James 1:27

8. What are some warnings given to the church, and individual members of it, when they begin to mix the worship of Him with worldly thinking? Revelation 2:12-16

- 9. Can individual churches or members of the church also sell themselves into slavery as Israel did? Explain your answer.
